

Elizabeth (Libby) Dodds Ashley, PharmD, MHS, FCCP, FIDP, BCIDP

Elizabeth S. Dodds Ashley, PharmD, MHS, is a Professor of Medicine and Operations Director for the Duke Antimicrobial Stewardship Outreach Network (DASON) based at Duke University. She has been an active antimicrobial stewardship pharmacist for more than 25 years. Her work and research in stewardship span a variety of patient care settings, including large academic medical centers, community hospitals, and long-term care facilities. She has served as a

member of the Antimicrobial Resistance Working Group at the Centers for Disease Control and an expert panel member of the Transatlantic Taskforce for Antimicrobial Resistance, among other appointments. She is a current liaison member and first pharmacist on the Presidential Advisory Council on Combating Antibiotic-Resistant Bacteria (PACCARB) representing SIDP. She is actively involved in several professional societies engaged in stewardship, including SHEA and SIDP, for which she recently served as President.
